Overview

Recommendation:

That the Two Spirit & LGBTQIA+ Action Plan, as attached as Appendix 1, be approved.

Highlights:



Orangeville protest part of national march against 'gender ideology' in schools

School board condemns 'non-peaceful, violent or aggressive actions' of some protesters

Protesters decrying what they call "gender ideology" in schools descended on downtown Orangeville as part a nation-wide movement calling itself "1 Million March 4 Children."

Demonstrations were planned in cities across Canada, including in Orangeville. Counterprotests were likewise planned throughout the country.

Dufferin Ontario Provincial Police said it had officers staggered along the march route, which saw traffic clogged on Broadway Wednesday, Sept. 20 morning, as people made their way to the planned stops at town hall, the local constituency offices of MPP Sylvia Jones and MP Kyle Seeback, as well as the Orangeville office of the Upper Grand District School Board (UGDSB) nearby on Amelia Street.

OPP media officer Terri-Ann Pencarinha said the provincial liaison team was also on hand working with those involved in order to minimize the impact on commuters and to ensure order and public safety.

Pencarinha said the protest was peaceful, and there was no police involvement beyond what was mentioned above.

However, a slightly different picture was painted by the public school board, which reported people pounding on windows, yelling for officials to come outside and Pride flags and supporting signs being ripped up.

The protests have been described as opposing sexualization and indoctrination of children at school, but those who counter the movement say it has also included significant misinformation about what is actually being taught at school.

Locally, the protest was met with statements denouncing the rhetoric ahead of the protests.

In a joint statement, Dmytro Basmat, president of Youth Activists Inc., and Julia Bertola, founder of Caledon PRIDE, said they were united in defending against what they termed "dangerous and discriminatory rhetoric from affecting students."

"The movement continues to push disproven and discriminatory views that promote a culture of intimidation directed towards trans and LGBTQ+ students," the statement reads.



"The movement continues to push disproven and discriminatory views that promote a culture of intimidation directed towards trans and LGBTQ+ students," the statement reads.

Following the protest, a statement was issued by UGDSB chair Ralf Mesenbrink and director of education Peter Sovran, saying they stand in solidarity with the 2SLGBTQIA+ community, and that they will not tolerate hate directed toward them.

UGDSB spokesperson Heather Loney said apart from seeing protesters pounding on windows and damaging Pride supporting signs, staff also witnessed protesters intimidating and yelling at a group of counterprotesters across the street.

And at Princess Elizabeth Public School, protesters walking by started banging on windows and yelling profanities, she said.

The Banner was not able to independently verify this information.

The board statement condemned the "non-peaceful, violent or aggressive actions of some of the protesters witnessed on school board grounds."

"We will not tolerate this behaviour, or any behaviour meant to intimidate our students, staff and school communities."

Perhaps you can follow up directly with Communications Manager Heather Loney. On September 20th, the Orangeville Banner published an article. In it, Mrs Loney "said apart from seeing protesters pounding on windows and damaging Pride supporting signs, staff also witnessed protesters intimidating and yelling at a group of counterprotesters across the street."

My updated list of questions for the UGDSB are below:

- 1) Was the school put in lockdown because of the march? What steps were taken to ensure student safety at the time of the march?
- 2) Have parents been notified of this incident? If so, how?
- 3) Were the police notified? Were reinforcements needed?
- 4) Was the OPP on scene to make arrests? If so, why were no arrests made? How come no charges were filed?
- 5) Is there video evidence to back up these claims? If so, when will it be released to the public?
- 6) What evidence did Mrs Loney observe before making that statement?

Up to this date, the Orangeville Banner has not been able to independently verify this story. Citizens of Orangeville are questioning the validity of the UGDSB's claims.

If you could please respond by noon, Friday October 6th, that would be great.
